AWARD-WINNING AUTHOR AND ASIA'S FIRST WINE MASTER SETS OUT TO BRIDGE THE GAP BETWEEN WINE AND THE ASIAN PALATE

TITTLE TATTLE: How did your interest in wine begin?

JEANNIE CHO LEE: It began when I was 18 and an exchange student at Oxford University. My first sip of quality wine was of a good Bordeaux red wine at a dinner. I didn't know what wine it was and was shy to ask, but I enjoyed it. The wine had both depth of fruit and an aged ethereal quality, and it tasted delicious. Both my intellect and senses were captivated by wine and it became a serious hobby for me. TT: What do you love about it? JCL: Wine is such a fascinating beverage with a story to tell. I learned a lot about life and

myself through studying wine. For example, I realised that great wines are created by grapevines with a certain amount of environmental stress throughout their lives. Greatness in people is achieved in the same way, not through living the easy life, but by constant challenges.

TT: Describe your most fascinating wine experience.

that possess great beauty, I cry. Several months ago at the cellars of Domaine de la Romanee Conti when I was tasting the 2008 Richebourg in barrel, the wine in the glass began to sing the most joyous song to me. It was

so beautiful, so moving, ethereal and potent all at once, and it brought tears to my eyes. TT: How discerning is the Asian palate when it comes to wine? **JCL:** We are exposed to a wide array of flavours because our cuisines utilise many herbs, spices and seasonings. This allows us to appreciate the wide range of wine flavours and relate it to food flavours. It also contributes to the refined and discerning palate that Asian wine lovers quickly develop. I hope guests at my (Grand Hyatt) wine pairing dinner will gain greater confidence when selecting wines to go with local dishes.
